

"DOMINI AL DI QUA DEL FARO": FROM FERDINANDO II TO VITTORIO EMANUELE II 1858 - 1862



The collection presented here is structured in three parts and focuses on the study of the stamps issued in the five-year period 1858/62, distributed in the territory that initially constituted the Kingdom of Naples ("Domini al di qua del Faro" that is the territories belonging to the Kingdom of Naples up to the Strait of Messina) and which then, thanks to the military victories of General Giuseppe Garibaldi, became an integral part of the unborn Kingdom of Italy.

The first part starts with the study of the Bourbon issue, unperforated and composed of 7 values printed in sheets of 200, issued during the reign of Ferdinand II of Bourbon, depicting the coat of arms of the "Two Sicilies"

in different shapes, executed in chalcographic shades different pink ones.

This is a selected set consisting of mint, used and covers. In addition to this issue, there is a selection of forgeries of the period to defraud the post office of the 2, 10 and 20 grana values, made in Naples between 1859 and 1861. The second part is dedicated to the provisional stamps of Garibaldi's "Dictatorship" and the "Lieutenancy", i.e. the stamps called "Trinacria" (November, 6th 1860) and "Croce di Savoia" (December, 6th 1860), obtained from the modification of the Bourbon stamp from ½ grano, or from the replacement of the value from ½ grano to ½ tornese and the colour from pink to blue, as regards the "Trinacria" and in the second case with the further replacement of the Bourbon coat of arms with the "Savoy Cross".

Here there are new stamps from both the "Trinacria" and the "Cross", a used selection of the same in the known colour shades and some examples of these on documents (newspapers, circulars and wrappers). All the specimens of the "Trinacria" and the "Croce di Savoia" have been plated. The third and final part of the collection focuses on the new issue composed of eight stamps with the head of Vittorio Emanuele II, called postage of the "Neapolitan Provinces", unperforated and lithographically printed with the relief head of the sovereign with the value still in grana. It was issued on the basis of the lieutenant decree of January, 6th 1861 and was officially put into circulation starting from February, 14th 1861. Then follows the analysis of all mint, used and on cover of the issue. There are also, as in the aforementioned case of the Bourbon stamps, some examples of forgeries of the time to defraud the post office.



MASINI ESSAYS (1858)

The Neapolitan engraver Giuseppe Masini, after having engraved the moulds of the first plate of ½, 1, 5, 10, 20, 50 grana and the first two plates of 2 grana and having delivered a first supply of these stamps to the Postal Administration, did not obtain the renewal of the contract which instead went to the cheaper Gaetano di Masa and his son Gennaro. To recover the work, Masini thought of proposing a new type of stamp, printed in letterpress, which would have allowed a considerable saving in manufacturing costs. For this purpose, in June 1858, he made a stamp of a single design for all values. Of this essay, a minting test was initially carried out without indicating the value and subsequently 100 stereotypes of the various values were set up in a single table, printed in different colours, on thin and medium thickness paper.




essay in blue without indication of the value block of four - medium thickness paper

The stamps were issued on January, 1st 1858, but no letters with this date are known as it was Sunday and therefore the post offices were closed. From this it follows that the first effective day of use was January 2nd 1858.




JANUARY, 2nd 1858, letter from Naples to Celle di S. Vito, franked 2 grana (1 sheet letter) with ½ lilac pink grano 1st plate, two vertical pairs canceled with two impressions of the framed "ANNULLATO" postmarks with on the reverse, affixed at the start, the three-line red linear stamp of the secondary workshop "NAPOLI 1858 2 GEN. S.FER.E CHI" (Naples S. Ferdinando e Chiaia).


JANUARY, 2nd 1858, letter from Naples to Genoa (*Kingdom of Sardinia*), franked 16 grana with 1 light pink grano + 5 lilac pink grana + 10 lilac pink grana, all belonging to the 1st plate, each canceled with the framed "ANNULLATO" postmark with the red "VIA DI MARE (E)" stamp and the pad tax sign "15" next to it on the front and affixed upon arrival. On the reverse, affixed at the start, the linear stamp with the date on two red lines "NAPOLI 1858 2.GEN." and the red arrival stamp "GENOA ARRIVAL 5 GEN 58".

Simple letter of 1 sheet, sent by sea with a commercial steamer, taxed on arrival in Genoa 15 cents for Sardinian fees.

With the circular from the General Post Office of Naples dated November, 21st 1861, Bourbon stamps were officially put out of circulation starting from that date.



MAY, 24th 1862, letter sent from Naples to Castelluccio, franked with a 2 grana stamp, out of validity for over 6 months, canceled with a pen cross and accompanied by the writing "unused stamp" (more probably with the intention of meaning "not valid").

The document was taxed 3 grana of which 2 for the port (letter of 1 sheet) and 1 grano for additional tax.





Main features of the table:

Very clear engraving and in the lower part, under the contour line of the drawing, a more or less imprinted line of colour is visible. In the upper part of the stamp the contour line of the drawing is often joined to the colour line.



Engraving not very clear, especially in the central drawing, in 170 examples out of 200 of the plate a small white dot is visible under the "N" of "NAPOLETANA".





Registered letter of 3 sheets for domestic purposes, of which 6 grana for ports, doubled for the fixed right of recommendation.

APRIL, 7th 1859, registered letter ("insured" in local terminology) from Maglie to Naples, franked 32 grana with 1 light pink grana 1st plate + 2 brownish pink grana 1st plate, vertical pair and single + 5 light pink grana 1st plate, pair and horizontal strip of three; canceled with the framed "ANNULLATO" postmark with the oval red "MAGLIE" stamp and the linear "ASSICURATA" stamp next to it on the front. Rate per 2 ounces letter (over 53 grams in weight).

JUNE, 20th 1859, letter from Naples to Turin, with 5 carmine pink grana 1st plate; canceled with the framed "ANNULLATO" postmark.

1 sheet letter franked up to the Neapolitan border, sent by land route through the Papal States and Tuscany ("VIA DI SARZANA" on the front) taxed 5 bajocchi for papal fees and final cumulative tax of 7 tenths of a Sardinian lira (Inclusive of all transit fees to be paid to each state).





1-sheet letter for correspondence sent by sea with a commercial steamer, taxed on arrival at desembarkation 15 cents (up to 7.5 grams) for Sardinian fees.

DECEMBER, 13th 1858, letter from Naples to Florence (Grand Duchy of Tuscany), franked 13 grana with 1 light pink grana 1st plate + 2 lilac pink grana 1st plate (cream colour paper) + 10 brownish pink grana 1st plate, canceled with the framed "ANNULLATO" postmark with the incoming tax sign "6" (crazie) next to it on the front.

1 sheet letter sent by sea with a French postal steamer (probably the Pausilippe), taxed on arrival 6 crazie for internal Tuscan fees.





Main feature of the plate: Less sharp print and lighter colours. Almost total absence of color spots.



DECEMBER, 11th 1858, letter from Naples to Marseille (*France*), franked 87 grana with 2 carmine pink grana 3rd plate + 5 light pink grana 1st plate + 10 lilac pink grana 1st plate + 20 lilac pink grana 1st plate + 50 grana lilac pink, canceled with three imprints of the framed "ANNULLATO" postmark with the framed red "P.D." stamp next to it on the front and the double circle of French entrance "D. SICILES MARSEILLE".

Three ports rate (over 15 grams of weight) free at destination, foreseen for correspondence Forwarded to Marseille by sea with the French Postal Services.



Letter of 5 sheets, sent by sea with a French postal steamer, taxed on arrival in pen for 80 cents (letter from four Sardinian ports, 30 grams, justified by the writing in pen on the front "30").



1859/61 FORGERY STAMPS OF THE PERIOD

These forgeries were printed with a small copperplate press, using thin metal plates on which a single reproduction was engraved. The paper is handmade, of different thicknesses, in some cases with horizontal or vertical laying. They were mostly used in Naples. The large quantity of these forgeries has always led us to believe that the forgeries, who were never discovered, acted with the complicity of some postal workers and perhaps even officials.

MONT. ED AVV" (Napoli Montecalvario ed Avvocata) and the red circle "PARTENZA DA NAPOLI 26 LUG. 1860".

JANUARY, 7th 1861, letter from Naples to Catania, franked 11 grana with 1 grano bright carmine 2nd plate + 10 grana lilac carmine, 5th type forgery; canceled with the framed "ANNULLATO" postmark, with the oval "FRANCA" cancel on the front, affixed in transit upon desembarkation in Messina.

One-sheet letter, sent free to destination in Sicily, by sea with a French postal steamer.



JULY, 11th 1860, registered letter ("insured" in local terminology) from Naples to Monteroduni (Molise), franked with 20 grana carmine, 5th type forgery; canceled with the framed "ANNULLATO" postmark, with the "ASSICURATA" cancel on the front. Registered mail for the interior of 1 ¼ ounces.




One-sheet letter, sent from Manfredonia to Foggia, franked with 2 grana lilac pink 1st plate, canceled with the framed "ANNULLATO" postmark with the light blue oval "MANFREDONIA" cancel next to it. The cancellation was placed on the stamp so as to cover the traces of a previous similar cancellation, in order to reuse it in postal fraud.



Letter of three sheets sent from Lecce to Naples, franked 6 grana with three pieces of the 2 lilac pink grana 1st plate, canceled with the framed "ANNULLATO" postmark with the red oval "LECCE" stamp next to it. Two of the three stamps were reused in postal fraud: the framed "ANNULLATO" postmark was placed on the stamps so as to cover the traces of a previous similar cancellation.

STAMPS WITH THE "BT" MONOGRAM IN THE WATERMARK

(Bonaventura Tajani, paper manufacturer)

The stamps of the Kingdom of Naples were printed on watermarked paper including decorations with the inscriptions "BOLLI POSTALI" on the sides and with 40 impressions of Bourbon lilies in the center. In the lower left corner was the monogram "B.T." (Bonaventura Tajani – paper manufacturer).





JUNE, 12th 1858, letter from Naples to Isernia, franked 3 grana (*letter of 1 and a half sheets*) with 1 carmine pink grano 2nd plate and with 2 light pink grana 3rd plate with on the left with the complete "BT" monogram in watermark (*manufacturer of the Bonaventura Tajani paper - pos.200 of the sheet*), canceled with the framed "ANNULLATO" postmark.







The ½ Tornese "Trinacria" stamp was made using a half plate (100 copies) of the ½ grano 2nd plate value for printing, issued by the Kingdom. The "G" of grano was chiselled and in its place a "T" was engraved to indicate tornese. This operation was performed with a tiny punch, much faster than an engraving with a burin. The punch measured only 2 millimetres, was placed on the plate and then beaten with a mallet. In order to have a perfectly uniform mark, the punch had to be positioned perfectly vertical and the stroke had to be clean. Having said that, within the various and inevitable punching defects, the most obvious is the double punching. Twelve were found, of which three were complete and nine were incomplete, showing only parts or traces of a second "T". Of these twelve double punchings, five are found in the first horizontal row.



THIN PAPER

Due to the porosity of the paper, the glue was strongly absorbed and over time the fatty substances went through the normal process of oxidation with the result of staining the stamps and at the same time making them less adhesive. Consideration was therefore given to ordering a new supply of paper better suited to overcome these drawbacks. The Neapolitan postal administration therefore commissioned a new supply of reams of paper from the Tajani paper mill in Vietri di Salerno. This paper, however, had to be modified in the mixture by the addition of a certain amount of glue to reduce its porosity and permeability and also to be smoother and thinner, as well as being glued directly in the factory. Although it does not appear from any administrative acts or reports of the period, it is almost certain that in January 1861 stamps of the Bourbon series and consequently also of the "trinacria" and "cross" were printed, using precisely sheets of the latter supply. Evidence of this is some specimens printed on thinner paper.

The normal handmade paper of Bourbon stamps is thick enough to prevent the design of the obverse from showing through on the reverse. In stamps printed on thin paper, the design that shines through on the reverse is always very evident, so much so that it is not uncommon for it to be mistaken for a decal.

The stamps of the Kingdom of Naples were printed on watermarked paper including decorations with the inscriptions "BOLLI POSTALI" on the sides and with 40 printings of Bourbon lilies in the center. In the lower left corner was the monogram "B.T." (Bonaventura Tajani – paper manufacturer). The same watermarked paper as the Bourbon stamps was also used for printing the "Trinacria".

FEBRUAY, 25th 1861, letter from Naples to Bari, franked with 2 blue grana, with inverted head, canceled with the framed "ANNULLATO" postmark with the Bourbon red circle next to it "PARTENZA DA NAPOLI 25 FEB. 1861".

FIRST KNOWN DATE FOR A STAMP OF NEAPOLITAN PROVINCES WITH INVERTED HEAD

STAMPS WITH EXTERNAL FRAME THREADS



MAY, 25th 1861, letter from Foggia to Naples, insufficiently franked for 4 grana (letter of 2 sheets) with 2 light blue grana, **two copies with the complete external framing thread at the top**, canceled with the Bourbon circle "FOGGIA 25 MAG. 1861", taxed on arrival for 1 additional grano together with the black circular postmark "Tassa per insofficiente francatura"; subsequently tax-free with a red oval "CORRETTA" postmark above the tax.



JULY, 11th 1861, header of registered letter, "insured" in local terminology, sent from Manduria, with postage of 14 grana composed of 1 dark gray grano, horizontal stripe of four of which the last example on the right with lateral framing thread + 5 red grana carmine, horizontal pair canceled with three postmarks of the stamp "MANDURIA 11 LUG. 1861", repeated alongside together with the straight block stamp "ASSICURATA".



The undisturbed use of the fake stamps of the Kingdom of Naples series of 1858 encouraged the forgers to continue with the "new" stamps. These forgeries, all carried out in Naples, are of three types and are quite easy to distinguish from the originals: the wordings are irregular and the heads are very coarse and without details. In particular in the 1st type the white crosses at the corners are the same in both height and width; in the 2nd type the crosses at the corners are higher than wide.







The three known types of fake heads: only type "C" is the one that most closely resembles the original.

JULY, 9th 1862, letter sent from NAPLES to Bern (*Switzerland*), franked with 10 grana bistre, 2nd type forgery head "C", canceled with the small lieutenancy circle "NAPOLI 9 GIU 62", repeated on the front together with the framed postmark "P.D.".

First rate letter free to destination, sent by land route through Piedmont (transit postmarks on the reverse of Arona and Verbano stating the route along Lake Maggiore for forwarding to destination).

Piece with 35 grana "tricolour" franking composed of 5 pink grana + 10 orange bistre grana 1st type forgery (head "B") + 20 yellow orange grana forgery (head "B") canceled with the circle "PARTENZA DA NAPOLI 28 MAGGIO 1861".

KINGDOM OF NAPLES - NEAPOLITAN PROVINCES

From February 14th, 1861, the new stamps arrived from Turin were put into circulation in Naples and the Provinces, but no official communication was given of the cessation of validity of the Bourbon ones which continued to be used by the people to an increasingly lesser extent for several months. The official provision that put the stamps of the Kingdom of Naples out of circulation was only issued on 21 November 1861.





MAY, 18th 1861, letter from Catanzaro to Naples, with mixed franking of 3 grana with Kingdom of Naples 1 carmine grano 2nd plate + Neapolitan Provinces 2 light blue grana, canceled with the fancy cancel n.21 of Emilio Diena's cataloging, combined on the front with the circle "CATANZARO 18 MAG. 1861".

LAST MONTH OF OFFICIAL VALIDITY (September 1862)



SEPTEMBER, 5th 1862, letter from Naples to Caltanissetta franked with 5 carmine grana, canceled with the small lieutenancy circle repeated alongside on the front.


First rate for Sicily, foreseen for correspondence forwarded by sea with the Postal Steamers at State's service.



SEPTEMBER, 27th 1862, piece franked with 6 copies of the ½ tornese yellow green stamp, canceled with the small lieutenancy circle "NAPOLI 27 SET 62".



SEPTEMBER, 29th 1862, letter from Lecce to Naples, franked with 2 dark blue grana, canceled with the double big Bourbon circle "LECCE SET. 1862", repeated alongside on the front.



USE OF THE PROVISIONAL ISSUE BETWEEN OCTOBER, 1st AND OCTOBER, 15th

The introduction of the Sardinian stamps into the Neapolitan area began on October, 1st 1862. From this date onwards, the tolerance of the provisional issue was established (head of Vittorio Emanuele II, but with the value still expressed in grana) until the 15th of the same month. However, there were conflicting interpretations from the postal employees in the treatment of correspondence franked with the stamps of the Neapolitan Provinces: it is in fact possible to find taxed and non-taxed correspondence in this short period.




OCTOBER, 2nd 1862, letter sent from Pescara to Forlì, franked 5 grana with 1 grey-black grano + 2 light blue grana horizontal copy. The document was not taxed and the stamps were considered valid.

First rate for the Northern Provinces.



OCTOBER, 7th 1862, first rate letter from Naples to Candela, franked with 2 slate blue grana. The stamp was not considered valid and the letter was pen taxed 1 ½ (equivalent to 15 Sardinian cents of which 10 to cover the rate of the letter and 5 postage due).



USE OF THE PROVISIONAL ISSUE AFTER OCTOBER, 15th 1862


After this date, the provisional issue with the value in grana was definitively put out of circulation. Correspondence still franked with these stamps was taxed 15 cents, of which 10 for the rate of the letter with a progression every 10 grams + 5 surcharge.



OCTOBER, 19th 1862, first rate letter from Castel di Sangro to Naples, franked with 2 grana. The stamp, "retouched" with 4 pen scratches, was not considered valid and the document was taxed, again in pen, 1½ (15 Sardinian cents).



FEBRUARY, 4th 1863, letter from Naples to Lecce, franked with 1 grano, three copies (vertical pair and single), out of use from almost 4 months, at the exchange rate of 15 cents that is in Italian simple carriage in force from January, 1st 1863. The stamps were not considered valid and the document was pen taxed 30 cents as an unstamped letter, with the word "fuori uso" written underneath them.



INTRODUCTION OF SARDINIAN-ITALIAN STAMPS



SEPTEMBER, 23rd 1862, letter sent from Cropani to Taverna, franked with Sardinia IV^A issue 5 cents yellowish green, two copies; canceled with the small lieutenancy circle "CROPANI 23 SET 62".

EARLY USE OF SARDINIA STAMPS IN THE NEAPOLITAN AREA EIGHT DAYS BEFORE THEIR OFFICIAL INTRODUCTION

From October, 1st 1862, Sardinian stamps with the value in cents of the Italian lira were officially introduced in the Neapolitan provinces.



OCTOBERT, 1st 1862, letter sent from Molfetta to Napoli, franked with Sardinia IV[^] issue 10 cents orange bistre; canceled with the Bourbon circle "MOLFETTA 1 OTT. 1862", repeated alongside on the front. First provisional rate for correspondence sent in the Neapolitan area (at the exchange rate equal to 2 grana).
